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Introduction


The dispatch ended the season with 199 actions and 107,499.51 acres. This compares to the ten year average of 235 actions and 172,000 acres. The first fire of the season started on April 3rd (the Browns Creek fire) and the last fire of the year started on October 25th (the Devils Rim fire). From June 1st through October 15th, South Central Idaho Interagency Dispatch Center preparedness levels were as follows: Planning Level 1 = 25 days; Planning Level 2 = 14 days; and a Planning Level 3 = 73 days. Dispatch was staffed 24 hours a day for a total of sixty five days this year.

An expanded organization was not activated for the 2008 season; however, the dispatch center, agency caches, and ground transportation coordinators supported 7 BLM & 3 FS type III incidents including the South Barker Wild Fire Use (WFU) incident. Support for the South Barker WFU was provided from August 7th through October 6th for a total of 61 days. SCIIDC sponsored 2 WFU Teams and 5 Fire Use Modules for the South Barker WFU Incident.

The center continues to cross train and build our employees' depth of experience. Vickie Jensen and Jill Leguineche, Assistant Center Managers, supervised the daily operations of the floor. Richard Wilson filled the lead aircraft position, Dee Jennings filled the Intelligence position and Cherie Ozga was the lead initial attack dispatcher. Trespass was moved within the supervision of the Center Manager with John Loungo as the program leader.

Two temporary employees returned for the 2008 season, although both held new positions, Keeley Shockey was the new assistant aircraft dispatcher and Joan Harding returned as a 1st year initial attack dispatcher. Three new temporary employees were hired. Tara Wright and Dani Bozzuto, as initial attack dispatchers and Maddison Mazur as the receptionist. Dee Jennings retired in October after 30 years of service. Detailers included Robin Brooks, Bonnie Freestone, Susan Brown, Rob Haddock, and Jared Fisher. Wildland Fire Apprentice students include, Chase Krapf, Chase Peterson, Jake Williams, and John Martens.

2008 Fuels and Weather

Fuel Moisture Summary:

Although 1000 hour fuel moisture levels on the Sawtooth National Forest were quite low at the beginning of spring, the longer, cooler and wetter than average spring weather allowed 1000 hour fuels to recover. As the fire season developed, 1000 hour fuel moisture levels dropped at an average rate since summer was quite seasonable and not overly hot. 1000 hour fuel moisture levels were in the double digits throughout July then fell to the upper single digits for the remainder of the fire season. 100 hour fuel moisture trended about average.

Live fuel moistures on the Sawtooth National Forest showed similar trends: quite high through July and then finally becoming more average into August. Even with good soaking rains in mid October, the warm dry fall and earlier fuel moisture levels caused live fuel moistures to be lower than the previous seven years recorded.

Twin Falls District experienced an extremely dry field season with little moisture during the months of July, August, and September. During these months, fuel monitoring showed record low fuel moisture at the reporting fuel moisture monitoring sights. These sights showed an average of twenty eight percent below average across the district, with the lowest reading of sixty six percent on July first at the Ohio Gulch sight. The fuel moistures stayed at these levels until the end of September when they began to rise.

Lightning Summary:

The first lightning-caused fire started on June 23, 2008 within the BLM Burley Field Office. Throughout June, July, and the first part of August, nine more lightning strikes started fires within SCIIDC's jurisdiction. On August 7th, the Sawtooth National Forest (Fairfield Ranger District) had a storm pass through which caused twelve new fires. Some of these fires were managed as Wild Fire Use incidents (WFU), one being the South Barker Incident which burned 37,725.00 acres and was considered a resource management success. Lightning-caused fires were frequent until August 19th, when the weather became hotter and drier. The last lightning-caused fire for the 2008 fires season was on Sept 30th, again within the BLM Burley Field Office. Lightning-caused fires were down 54% from 2007.

Initial Attack Resources

South Central Idaho Interagency Dispatch hosts an array of resources. During the 2008 Fire Season, the Twin Falls District once again hosted the Alaska-based Chena Hotshot Crew from mid-June until the early October. The Sawtooth Hotshot Crew started their season May 12th and finished the season here at home on the South Barker WFU October 6th. The South Idaho Interagency Type II Crew was able to take one assignment this year. Aviation resources were again active this year. Air Attack flew on a total of 54 fires this summer. Both the Sawtooth Helitack and the Twin Falls District Helitack spent time in California this summer supporting the national effort. For the 2008 fire season, the BLM staffed a total of 16 engines, including two Tatra engines, and 6 water tenders. The Sawtooth Forest staffed 10 engines this season, four of which were contracted by DB Jet. The BLM Dozer started the year by taking a 60 day assignment to Texas beginning in February. Both the BLM and the Forest Service Base Camps were mobilized multiple times this year to local Type III incidents.

Aviation:

The Twin Falls District and Sawtooth National Forest both had average fire seasons in relation to aircraft. The Twin Falls District’s remote bases were activated seven times throughout the season and supplied 38 SEAT loads of retardant. The Twin Falls Air Base relocated to the Gooding Airport in July to accommodate for the U.S. Navy Blue Angel Demonstration Team. This season also brought a number of Heavy Air Tankers to the Twin Falls Air Base for longer periods, resulting in a more comprehensive response to a larger number of initial and extended attack fires. The Twin Falls District procured a Call When Needed contract again this year for the Air Attack Platform. The Twin Falls Helitack Crew spent several weeks in California and Utah on fire assignments. The Sawtooth Helitack had a total of 10 Rappels on three fires this season. The Sawtooth Helitack had one 14 day assignment this summer to California. The Boise Smokejumpers staffed Twin Falls remote base for 18 days and jumped 5 fires during this time. Various aviation overhead resources took single-resource assignments off-district this summer.

Local Fire Departments:

Due to the high amount of fire activity in California this year, the State to State agreement was activated to send Structure Fire Department engines to help support the local fire activity. Working closely with Idaho Department of Lands, South Central Idaho Interagency Dispatch mobilized eight structure engines, as well as transports, on July 3rd to multiple locations in California. Departments that assisted in the effort were as follows: Rock Creek, Ketchum, Wendell, Burley, West End, Hailey, Sun Valley, and Minidoka.

Safety

The Sawtooth Forest is slightly above average for 2008 with 12 safety related incidents. This is mostly due to the volume of poison oak incidents in California and the amount of time that was spent there. The Twin Falls District had 16 safety related incident reports this year. The 5 year average for the BLM is 18. Overall, the 2008 fire season was safe and efficient.

Emergency Stabilization and Rehabilitation

The Twin Falls District accomplished many ESR projects in 2008. Approximately 470 miles of fence repairs were completed. The construction of approximately 65 miles of temporary fence was completed, while about 57 miles of temporary fence was removed from previous fires. Drill seedings for ESR were completed both by contract and with BLM ESR and Fire employees. The seedings completed were approximately 16,500 acres. BLM employees also built 55 erosion structures on two fires, the Nature and East Slide Rock Ridge. Twin Falls District also completed aerial seedings (sagebrush seed) that covered 19,050 acres. ESR's largest accomplishment was inventorying and treatment of approximately 600,000 acres, the majority of the acres coming on the Murphy Complex Fires.

The Sawtooth National Forest continued to complete fire rehab on the Castle Rock and Trail Creek fires near Ketchum and the Black Pine 2 fire east of Malta. On the Castle Rock fire the following was completed: improved road drainage (0.6 miles of the Ketchum/Featherville Road) and replacing culverts; improved trail drainage on 71 miles of trail; removing 0.25 miles of non-system road; planted bitterbrush on 125 acres; applied 380 acres of wood and ag. straw mulch; completed design work to relocate 10 miles of trail; seeded 72 acres in Limeklin Gulch; installed 9 grade control structures; completed noxious weed treatment on 800 acres; and constructed a flow deflection berm.

On the Trail Creek fire 160 acres of noxious weed treatment took place.

On the Black Pine 2 the following was completed: seeding 283 acres at the Black Pine mine leach pad, impoundment, emergency spillway, and outfall channel; installed 5000 feet of pipe and drip lines; improving road drainage (3 miles) and replacing culverts; installed three gabion check structures and berms; noxious weed treatment on 100 acres; seeded 640 acres lower Black Pine & Formation Canyons to prevent cheatgrass encroachment; and replaced 5 miles of boundary fence.

Fire Restrictions

South Central Zone did not enter into fire restrictions in 2008.

Mitigation/Fuels

The Upper Rock Creek Canyon Fuels Reduction Project. Homeowners meeting at the Rock Creek Rural Fire Department included 10 homeowners. Mitigated 80 acres of continuous canopy cover of brush to maximize the potential for slowing a wildland fire's spread. Individual Home Ignition Zone Assessments were done for 16 homeowners.

Re-seeding project of 120 acres in Shoshone of the Red Bridge fire. Approximately 18 homeowners benefitted from the project.

REDZONE: The Mid-Snake RC&D REDZONE Crew provided REDZONE mapping for Oakley and Albion Fire Districts. Two hundred and two houses were mapped and provided with prevention and FIREWISE information. The Minidoka REDZONE Crew completed 115 home evaluations in the Minidoka Fire District and West End Fire District. They also maintained a booth at the Minidoka County Fair.

Noxious Weed Program: Twin Falls, Cassia, Camas, and Jerome Counties all were assisted with the Co-op Weed Management Areas by the Mid-Snake and Twin Falls BLM program. Twin Falls County sprayed 15,000 acres and held a community spray day in Rock Creek Canyon. They also continued work in the Roseworth Area and sprayed noxious weeds of concern. Cassia sprayed 425 acres for range land thistle in Gun Canyon. Jerome County sprayed 120 acres for Rush Skeleton and Diffuse Knapweed. Camas County sprayed and inventoried 10,000 acres.
