COURSE DESCRIPTION

Intermediate Wildland Fire Behavior is a classroom-based skills course designed to prepare the prospective fireline supervisor to undertake safe and effective fire management operations. It is the second course in a series which collectively serves to develop fire behavior prediction knowledge and skills.

Fire environment differences are discussed as necessary and instructors stress local conditions.

OBJECTIVES

- Identify and describe the environmental, topographic, and fuel factors which influence wildland fire behavior.
- Describe interaction of fuels, weather and topography on fire behavior, tactics and safety.
- Describe causes of extreme fire behavior conditions.
- Interpret, communicate, apply and document wildland fire behavior and weather information.
